Many of them have taken significant steps forward in faith; such as leaving other employment to join our team, investing sacrificially in the lives of youth even when it comes with personal heartache, and waiting patiently on the Lord for answers to life direction questions. Urban ministry is not easy, but it is worth it. Thank you for the many ways you support our ministry team; often you *are* the encouragement that keeps us going!

I believe whole-heartedly in the strategic importance of leadership development. This past year, we launched our first neighborhood youth council with huge success. These 12 teenagers, under the guidance of our staff, are learning about leadership and how to address issues of change needed in our community. Some people label our youth as high-risk and stop there, but I believe God has a fuller perspective. These are His children – with His potential - and we're excited they are learning what it means to stand up for justice.

Finally, **I want to affirm our commitment to the Gospel** - the Good News of Jesus Christ. We are thrilled to see how children, teens, and adults have grown spiritually this year. Our summer outreach was so impacting that at the request of children, we launched a Saturday kid's church and strengthened our tween girls Bible study group this fall. We also affirm that God cares about all areas of our community life such as relationships between people (reconciliation), the physical environment, sharing our resources, and fighting injustice. Practitioners of Christian community development (that's us!) even see the most mundane details of life, such as picking up trash off the sidewalk, as giving witness to God's desire for His shalom here on earth.

May God bless you as you read about all that He has done in 2012 at The Boston Project.

Youth & Family Ministries Highlight: Neighborhood Youth Council

We believe that young people can create DRAMATIC change in our neighborhood. In 2012, we launched our Talbot-Norfolk Triangle [TNT] Youth Council.

planning neighborhood beautification projects and community events to identifying key problems and working with law enforcement and elected officials to find solutions, the TNT Youth Council members are developing their leadership skills, public speaking abilities, and self-confidence in representing their community before others. For most, this is their first leadership role. For us, it is a partnership with young people who share the vision for building a strong community.

More from Youth & Family Ministries:



- Spiritual Outreach. We strengthened our "Real Life" (teens) and "Pretty Tween Girls" Bible studies (pictured *left*), and started EPIC, a Saturday kid's church in the park.
- Youth Jobs. This summer, we hired 35 local teenagers through our Park Patrol programs. Our goal is to develop life and workplace skills. Youth jobs is a proven strategy to reducing violence.

Service-Learning Programs Highlight: Summer Missions Program

Amazing! This was our 17th year of hosting the Summer Missions Program [SMP]. Our theme, "What do you See(k)?" was based on Matthew 6:33; "Seek first the kingdom of God." Youth had the opportunity to serve in new ways, reflecting on issues of justice they see, while diving into the very real conversations of what we *seek* in our own lives. Using service projects, creative teaching activities and community building as relational tools, youth encountered Christ in transformative ways. We look forward to an exciting 2013 SMP.

More from Service-Learning Programs:

• Successful Transition. In the spring of 2012, we hired Nik Locker to fill our Mission Trip Director position to oversee all our overnight mission trips. We thank God for Keith & Sarah Riddle who developed these trips for over 10 years.

 Local Volunteers. In an ongoing effort to increase volunteer opportunities for neighbors, we hosted several large community events where neighbors and church groups served side-by-side on TNT-initiated greenspace projects.

• Individuals. We saw a marked increase in the number of individuals who are regularly volunteering with programs like Homework Center, Fair Foods, summer park activities (pictured right), Bible studies, and behind-the-scenes work, as well.

Community Development Highlight: New Community Garden

Neighbors planted vegetables in our new Children's Learning Community Garden this inaugural season. Once a vacant overgrown lot, teenagers employed through Park Patrol *(pictured below)*, plus neighbors and volunteers, continued construction on this new community space. We look forward to putting the finishing touches on this garden in 2013.



More from Community Development:

- Family Fun Night. Every Monday this summer, neighbors came to Elmhurst Park to have FUN including bingo, a steel drum band, carnival night, a gospel concert, and more!
- **Planning Initiatives.** We are part of several comprehensive planning processes that leverage resident ideas to build a strong community. In the works are CrossRoads Cafe and a Youth Jobs HUB (*from Millennium 10*), energy efficiency and green development on a large, neighborhood scale (*LEED-ND, Eco-Innovation District*), and public transportation equity and improvements (*Fairmount Corridor*).
- Fair Foods. We re-launched a weekly Fair Foods site on our street, where families can get a bag of fresh produce for \$2 (valued at \$30⁺), meeting hunger and nutritional needs.




Financial Statement & Contributors Fiscal Year 2012 (January-December)
