Real Life Retreats We're Going Places!

Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example for the believers in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith and in purity.

- 1 Timothy 4:12

"1... 2... 3... Go!"

For half a moment, I wondered if anything would happen. Then almost immediately, I was startled at how LOUD the guys in our small group were praying - all at once - at the top of their lungs. I've only heard each of them pray once or twice before – mostly quiet, short prayers that displayed nervousness. Now, they were literally shouting their prayers so loud that I'm sure we disturbed the girls' small group upstairs.

We were in New Hampshire on a retreat with our Real Life Bible study group. Six youth - 3 girls and 3 guys - with 3 Boston Project staff. We are a diverse bunch of people all in different places, personally and spiritually. Some are committed Christians, a few are brand new to the faith, and others are checking out what it means to follow Jesus.

Both the guy's and gal's small groups were doing "Prayer Cards." This activity (developed by The Boston Project) is designed to teach us about prayer by creatively involving everyone in praying together. We pray for specific things ("WHAT" cards) in different ways ("HOW" cards) all based on examples from the Bible.

Of course, the first "HOW" card the guys drew was to "shout" our prayer based on Psalm 66:1-2: "Shout with joy to God, all the earth! Sing the glory of his name; make his praise glorious!" I cringed a little inside, knowing that even praying out loud in a normal voice was a challenge for most of these youth. Then the guys started asking questions: "So, do we really have to shout our prayers?" (Yes); "Do we have to have our eyes closed?" (It's up to you); "Can we all shout together?" (Great idea). After we covered all the bases, it seemed we were ready to go. Now came the moment to pray...

The guys blew me away! They not only filled the house with their prayer shouts, they prayed with compassion and love. As I shouted alongside them, I relished listening to their prayers for one another – prayers to graduate, to understand God better, for protection, and more.

The prayer time couldn't have lasted for more than a minute or so, but in the midst of this atmosphere, **I confessed to God that I had underestimated this group of teenagers** – their spiritual hunger, their willingness to seek God in new ways, and their care for one another.

Again and again, the teenagers impressed us with their depth and eagerness to experience God. Another powerful moment came on Sunday morning when we spent time celebrating the cool things God had done. Even though my spectacular fall on cross-country skis was a highlight for several people, we gave thanks for so much more:

- On the way to the retreat, we went to an art show to support one of our young women who had her photography on exhibit. She sold three photographs to support iSanctuary, a ministry that works with survivors of human trafficking.
- Many teens were willing to try new things outside their comfort zone; like cross-country skiing, a moonlit hike, new ways of praying, and spending time in solitude and silence.
- During an intense group conversation about how God answers prayer, one youth offered an inspiring perspective on why God may not answer prayers the way we want. Everyone was impacted by his words, which clearly reflected wisdom from God. He is a young believer, but we can see God is going to use him as a spiritual leader in our group. On Easter Sunday, he was baptized at a local church!

• One of the guys shared that he wants to start following Jesus.

When we began our winter/spring Real Life Bible study series, it seemed interesting that God led us to teach about spiritual disciplines (fasting, solitude, etc.) mostly with unchurched teens. Little did we know what He was going to do! It's clear now to see how God is using these simple practices to help move our young people closer to Him than ever before...and their enthusiasm is contagious!

After that first round of prayer shouts, I wondered if we would need to apologize to the girl's group for being so loud. But before I could go upstairs, I heard shouting begin, and smiled.

PRAISE GOD for a great Real Life retreat, recent baptism of two long-time neighbors, new community partnership to serve youth ages 10-14, outreach through 38 college students during spring break, new financial partners, opportunity to share at Chinese Bible Church of Greater Boston's winter retreat, and for God stretching us in faith to "expect great things, attempt great things" for Christ (quote from missionary William Carey).

YOUTH JOBS. Ask God to provide funding and/or partnerships to hire 35-40 teenagers this summer. Pray for a new initiative we are championing called the Youth HUB; a strategy to increase youth jobs locally.

We are inspired by our staff team! Each person has a unique story that motivates them to give and sacrifice themselves for the sake of loving God and loving others. This month, Percy Ballah, one of our Children & Youth Outreach Workers, shares about a recent event that touched on why he works with The Boston Project Ministries. What has God done in your life that brings you to a place of giving yourself for others?



Déjà Vu: The Little Boy with the Grocery Bag

Have you ever walked into a house and the aroma of food permeating the air gave you a flashback to your mom's cooking? The delightful smell triggered a memory that made you feel like you were living in the past all over again. This feeling is often called *déjà vu* — all of us have moments like these in our lives.

Recently, my wife had a déjà vu moment that I'd like to share with you. One day when Katie was picking me up from work, she noticed a young boy carrying a large grocery bag of food. He had gotten the food from The Boston Project's *Fair Foods* truck; which weekly sells healthy produce to neighbors for \$2 a bag. As we walked the boy home, Katie recalled carrying grocery bags as a child for miles with her mother and siblings from the grocery store.

Much like this young boy, Katie was considered "at-risk" because of the drugs, violence, and different forms of abuse that influenced her neighborhood. Statistically the odds of her being successful were stacked against her. Many of her friends ended up in gangs, prison, strip clubs, or made other poor life choices. But Katie's life moved in a different direction because someone intervened. For Katie, it was staff at the Salvation Army.



At The Boston Project, we also believe wholeheartedly that positive intervention in the lives of neighborhood kids will make a lasting impact on their future.

My wife gives credit to Jesus and her mentors for encouragement and support as a child. To me, this reflects the heart of The Boston Project. Our ministry demonstrates the love of Jesus Christ through initiatives such as a free summer drop-in program at Elmhurst Park, leadership development opportunities for teens, after-school homework help and more. At the same time, we also share with youth and children the hope found in Jesus Christ that everyone needs to truly succeed in life.

So, why do I work at The Boston Project? Well, when I see young people in our neighborhood, I see my wife when she was a child. Right now God has placed us here to help point youth in the right direction. However, we can only fulfill our work with your prayers and financial support. Next time you pick up grocery bags, I pray that you will think of us and how we can partner together to impact more young people like Katie and the boy with the grocery bag.
